The Mountains Are Alive with the Sound of Music

Ambling along the Shamokin Springs Nature Preserve Loop, we come upon a footbridge. Suddenly, out of the quiet of the summer's day, the sweet sound of an oboe fills the air with mellifluous sounds. A bassoon, French horn, clarinet, and flute soon join the oboe permeating the air with Samuel Barber's Summer Music for Woodwind Quintet, Op. 31. A little mountain magic is happening and is a feast for the senses. Cascading streams surrounding the musicians add to the mix in perfect harmony. We stand transfixed, listening - standing on the little bridge enjoying the surround sound. The musicians have become one with nature. The music was written by a composer whose creative spirit flowed freely like the stream unbridled by the musical currents of his time. It is a perfect match.

Around a few more bends in the pathway is another academy chamber ensemble. You can hike a little further and enjoy a string quintet - glorious music to behold.

"I'm so happy to know that classical music will not die," said Cheyenne a clarinet playing academy student working toward her masters in music at Florida State University. She has been so delightfully surprised to find the Wintergreen community so supportive of the arts and is elated to know that symphonies will be in her future and not relegated to the same fate of the Dodo bird. There are many other talented students passionate in their desire to become accomplished musicians that are here studying with music masters in the Wintergreen Summer Music Academy.

"People actually come out to see you perform and enjoy classical music in this community. This makes me so happy," stated Lauren, a flute player working on her music degree at McGill University in Montreal.

"I love waking up here, being a part of this musical experience, and not having to travel back and forth," says Genevieve, a bassoon player studying at Michigan State University.

People, like Maria and Paul Spence, have created a scholarship fund enabling students to learn from musical masters in a program aimed at musical growth. Young instrumentalists and composers spend time with outstanding professional musicians listening,

Coming up next is the **5th Annual Blue Ridge Mountain Music Fest...and More**

The Blue Ridge Mountains are a painter's paradise, rich with the pink of mountain laurels; the blues, lavenders and purples of mountain and sky; the greens of the summer forest, turning to fire as the autumn advances; and, when the eye is weary, the subtle, stark colors of winter. But the Blue Ridge has a voice as well. The Blue Ridge speaks through mandolins and guitars; fiddles and basses; banjos and autoharps. The Blue Ridge speaks in the plaintive high lonesome tenor of the balladeer and the longing soprano sigh of the weary mountain woman. The Blue Ridge sings the story of America's roots. This rich tradition is featured at the daylong 5th Annual Blue Ridge Mountain Music Fest on **Saturday, August 21, noon-7:00pm at the Evans Center.**



The 2010 program features **Junior Sisk and Rambler's Choice**, a group that is rapidly being recognized as one of America's finest traditional bluegrass bands. The group also features Jason Tomlin, formerly a member of the Deer Creek Boys, on mandolin and tenor solos. Also appearing will be **The Steel Wheels**. This group features acoustic music ranging from old time, country folk, infused with elements of gospel, blues, and rock and roll. From the far southwest of Virginia comes the family-based old time group the **Whitewall Mountain Band**. The day's performances will conclude with the Appalachian string band music of **Kim and Jimbo Cary** and **Pete and Ellen Vigour**.

Also on Wintergreen Performing Arts' late summer schedule is the **International Wine and Food Festival on Saturday, September 4 – Labor Day Weekend**. Explore wines from around the world – over 50 wines from Australia, France, Germany, Italy and Spain, New Zealand, Chile, Argentina, South Africa, California, and, of course, Virginia.

And to end the month of September there is the popular **Oktoberfest on Saturday, September 25**. A celebration of German culture and food – a family event in a beer garden setting. Enjoy traditional “oom-pah” band music and taste local microbrewery beers while feasting on bratwurst and potato salad.

Secrets from a Chef's Recipe File

GOLDEN GAZPACHO

Ingredients

- 2 yellow peppers: halved, cored and seeded
- 1-2 Tablespoons olive oil
- 1 banana pepper: halved, cored and seeded
- 2 pounds yellow tomatoes, cored and quartered
- 1-2 cucumbers, peeled, seeded and coarsely chopped
- 2 small yellow squash, coarsely chopped
- 1 large sweet onion, diced
- 1 celery stalk, trimmed and sliced.
- 1 medium jicama, peeled and diced (or tart apple like Granny Smith or Albemarle Pippin, peeled cored and diced)
- 2 cloves garlic
- 3 cups vegetable broth or chicken stock
- 1-2 Tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- 4 Tablespoons fresh chopped herbs (basil, mint, parsley, chives, etc)
- 2 Tablespoons extra virgin olive oil (plus extra for drizzling on each portion, as desired)
- Dash of hot pepper sauce or to taste
- Kosher Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
- Pinch of sugar
- Garnish: Chopped chives and fresh steamed sweet corn cut from the cobb.
- Optional: 1 pound fresh lump crabmeat tossed in a little Old Bay

Directions

Place yellow peppers in a roasting pan, cut side down, drizzle with olive oil and roast @ 400° for 22-25 minutes. Immediately transfer to a large bowl, cover bowl with plastic wrap and let pepper halves steam for 8-10 minutes. Loosen skin from peppers and discard skin. Scrape any pan juices/oil from roasting pan into bowl.

Add remaining ingredients (except garnishes) to bowl, toss and then blend in batches in food processor to desired smoothness/chunkiness. I like to puree about half and “pulse” the other half so it's fairly chunky, making sure garlic cloves are in batch that's pureed.

Chill several hours before serving; garnish with corn, chives or other herbs and fruity extra virgin olive oil. Take the opportunity to experiment with a variety of vegetables -avocado is a favorite addition of mine. If you top this Golden Gazpacho with crabmeat and serve with a good loaf of bread (and perhaps a wedge of cheese) you'll have the perfect summer supper!

Wintergreen Fire and Rescue Updates

Fire Department Update

One of the largest events for the Wintergreen Fire Department each year is the July 4th fireworks display. Each year, most of the staff and volunteers, as well as members from neighboring departments are on hand to make sure the community can safely enjoy the evening. The last unit left the mountain at 1:00AM after an evening of relatively few problems. At 4:50AM, there was a problem, and it was huge.

On Blue Chickory Lane in the Stoney Creek community, a house was fully engulfed in flames, while the occupants were inside. Within five minutes, our crews arrived and were met by the occupants whom had thankfully escaped without injury.

Crews worked for over three hours to make certain the fire was contained to one property. The dry conditions, and proximity of the home to thick woods, made this a bit of a challenge. Ten of our own firefighters, with the support of twenty from neighboring departments battled the blaze. The ladder truck was on-scene to establish a "water curtain" between the affected home and unaffected homes, should the primary attack strategy fail. Enough of the home was destroyed for it to be considered a total loss. The cause of the fire, while not at all suspicious, remains under investigation by the insurance company, which is standard procedure for a major loss.



This fire should remind us all of several things:

- Know your escape route.
- Have and maintain smoke detectors and alarms.
- Support your fire department in whatever way you can.
- Appreciate that no Fire or Rescue agency in Nelson County is capable of handling all emergencies by themselves, and our mutual-aid agreements are very important.

As the annual fire department fund drive winds down we sincerely thank each of you for yet another successful year, and we wish the rescue squad well with their drive, which is about to begin.

Rescue Update

On average, nearly three times each day the Wintergreen Rescue Squad responds to a 911 emergency. Fortunately, most calls aren't life-threatening, however at times, seconds count. The only way for the volunteers and staff to maintain proficiency is through practice and training.

This is the time of year when we are focused heavily on training and recruitment as the pending ski season draws nearer. It's hard to think about snow skiing when it's 100+ degrees; however it takes several months for us to prepare new volunteers. We always need new volunteers, and in fact are in serious need of volunteers who are able to run calls at nights and on weekends.

The annual rescue fund-drive will soon begin and while we recognize that times are difficult for everyone, please know that every contribution, no matter the size, is very important.



We will soon be taking delivery of a new cot for one of our ambulances. This shouldn't seem like a very big deal, however the price tag is \$12,000 and we need four of them! This is just one of many examples of how very expensive the items we need can be.

Please remember the Rescue Squad is a completely different organization from the Fire Department and therefore has an independent annual fund-drive.

As always, we are willing to share any number of "value-added" services with you.

ON THE DECK

Good orderly direction is the mantra of the day. Order room by room creating clean empty surfaces and clutter free rooms. But wait, here is a book that I must thank the sender for. Do it now, I say to myself. And so I sit down outside and take the time to write a letter. Moving my pen across the paper writing words to reach someone is such a pleasurable occupation.

A deep slow breath, a letting go of tense muscles. Becoming aware of the feel of a freshening breeze, the billowing the canvas of the umbrella and the sound of pond water ripple, the lifting and falling of the leafy oak tree branches, the sunlight and the odorless air. Being on the deck is like being afloat in the trees. Creating a calming interlude in a busy cleaning day and a music filled month. Why not write some more?

The raccoon is angry at the bubblers in our little ponds and has ripped one apart. In the dark of one early morning, in the pond where Ed's goldfish live, I heard noisy gropings after the other pump along with an odd mewling sound. I removed the screen from the window and shone the flashlight on the ground below. An enormous mother raccoon startled and backed into the woods with her kit scurrying out of the beam of light after her.

Another mother fared not so well. After three weeks of sitting, the junco abandoned her nest in my doorway geranium pot, leaving three unhatched eggs. I had seen a thin silver and black snake nearby resting its head on a fern. Whether it played a role in frightening her away remains a mystery of the forest.

But now, my peaceful interlude on the ship of letters really must conclude. Down with the pen and up with the dust cloth.

BEAR SMART NEWS

We have had 9 reported bear sightings in June and numerous sightings in July, so obviously we need to be cautious about bears. There was one entry into a home through a screen in June. The bear entered and left without damaging anything. Leaving food outside, unattended is a sure attraction; likewise, food on a screened porch will provide incentive for entry.

Be sure to report sightings or break-ins to the front gate--325-8520.

Remind your neighbors who may be feeding the birds that it is not allowed from April 1-December 1.

Bob Scott has been invited by the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries (DGIF) to serve on the Stakeholders Committee to revise the 10 year bear management plan for the Black Bear in Virginia. We are the first Bear Smart Community in Virginia. The DGIF estimates that there are 16,000 bears in Virginia and numbers are increasing, so it is important for us to continue our efforts. While many communities are having serious problems, Wintergreen is living with the bears quite successfully, thanks to being "bear smart."

Let's keep it up!

Our clubhouse continues to improve! We were finally able to redo the kitchen this summer. The facility is utilized constantly, and the covered deck and new kitchen make it wonderful. New Kitchen Details

Our new kitchen should be complete by the time this article is published. We are installing locks on the cabinets, then everything will be thoroughly cleaned. We are also having one additional rolling island built. The two islands will provide us with lots of storage space and a wonderful ability to configure the kitchen for many different uses.

Cell Phone Update: According to Curtis Sheets, who spoke at a Mountain Women meeting in June, Verizon has abandoned its plans for erecting cell phone towers and will be doing no further improvements in Nelson County. AT&T will be installing 2 new towers (vicinity of Water Works Lane) and replacing one of the two towers in the area of Fern Circle. This work will bring 4G service to the mountain. The best coverage right now is through Intelos who will be installing a tower across from the Ski Barn.

Knox Boxes: These secure boxes, containing a key to your house, can be installed next to your power meter and a sticker can be placed on your door letting firemen responding to a fire know that a key is available (and so will not knock your door in). The boxes cost approximately \$180.00 and are installed by the Fire Department.

 Will the shrieking ever stop?

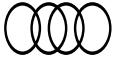
Changed the batteries

 Please make it stop

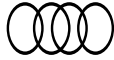
Call for help...not this time
